

How to Avoid Positive Stinking

It would be helpful to recognize the difference between being "positive" all the time and true submission to Jesus Christ.

To be positive all the time is a very willful act. We are making ourselves be that way. We are working to do something of our own volition. We are in charge of our lives, the masters of our fate, the conquerors of our souls.



To be positive in this way is to deny the negative feelings that squirm just below the surface of our lives. We refuse to acknowledge them. We do not want to deal with them. They put a damper on our personal goal of being positive all the time.



True submission to Jesus Christ, however, involves being especially aware of the dark spots in our souls, the negative feelings (if you will). We are not trying to spread a glossy happy paint over the weak and knotted wood, but instead desire to expose the weak and knotted wood to Jesus for His healing touch.

But wandering this world in complete submission to Jesus Christ enables us to give up what we would no longer desire to suppress; eliminate permanently what we would no longer desire to see explode within us, surprising even ourselves, as it seeps onto the highways and byways of our lives. Our prayer time should be spent asking Jesus for strength to actually do what He asks us to do: Love those who are very challenging to love.

The wisdom of the wise is to understand his way, but the folly of fools is deceit. Proverbs 14:8 [MKJV]






